Supervisors Report

Bill paying/audit of bills

OFFICIAL MEETING TIMES, ONCE MOVED UPON, CAN BE FOUND IN THE MINUTES, ON THE OFFICIAL SIGNBOARD AT TOWN HALL AND POSTED IN THE OFFICIAL TOWN NEWSPAPER AS IS REQUIRED BY TOWN LAW

Supervisor Macko asked for approval for newly elected town official training offered by the Association of Towns and by Edmunds Gov Tech, for a total amount of \$375.00;

Mr. Bear moved, seconded by Mr. Bensen, to allow these educational opportunities. Carried 5 ayes

An updated resolution which was previously touched upon at the last two meetings regarding changes to the Town's Procurement Policy was read by Supervisor Macko; it was noted that our policy was very old and our levels were approximately half the standard levels of New York State. This updated resolution will bring us to consistent levels with those of NYS. No further discussion.

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Bear, to approve these changes as stated and adopt this resolution, attached.

Supervisor Macko would like to schedule a time for the swearing in of elected officials;

Mr. Rauf moved, seconded by Mr. Bensen, to hold a swearing in ceremony on January 1, 2022 at 6:00 pm in Town Hall,

The gazebo in Veteran's Park has been reserved for another Summer Concert Series for seven Tuesdays between July 12th and August 23rd, 2022.

Supervisor Macko notes an Organizational meeting also needs to be scheduled;

Mr. Bear moved, seconded by Mr. Richards, to hold the Organizational meeting at Town Hall on January 3, 2022 at 7:00 pm

Carried 5 ayes

Highway Superintendent Dudley is seeking approval to purchase a used 2009 Mack snow plow/wing/sander from Auctions International, using highway reserve funding. Notes it is in very good condition and would serve as the 5th truck for the 5th route. Comparable vehicles run between \$40,000 -\$80,000;

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Bear, to purchase this truck as Mike just explained to us. Carried 5 ayes

The drafted, new employee handbook has been provided to the town board members; Supervisor Macko would like to set up a few workshop meetings to review this line by line;

Mr. Rauf moved, seconded by Mr. Bensen, to hold 2 workshops to review the drafted employee manual: the first, on January 3, 2022 at 6:00 pm, before the Organizational meeting, and the second, on January 17, 2022 at 6:00 pm, before the regularly scheduled town board meeting. Both will be held at Pioneer Town Hall.

Carried 5 ayes

A decision on the cannabis retail dispensary/lounge within the town of Greenville must be determined by December 31st. If we do not act, Greenville will be considered a "yes" in allowing dispensaries/lounges, and it cannot be changed. If we opt out, we can always opt in, but not vice versa.

Mr. Bensen moved, seconded by Mr. Rauf, to hold a public hearing on Thursday, December 30, 2021 at 6:30 pm in Town Hall regarding this local law on marijuana.

Carried 5 aves

Supervisor Macko received the 2022 Greene EMS contract, which provides paramedic coverage in town. The cost is \$30,342 for the upcoming year.

Mr. Bear moved, seconded by Mr. Richards, to approve this 2022 Greene EMS contract.

Carried 5 ayes

Attorney Rappleyea provided follow up information on issues previously discussed regarding Circle Drive. A report on the Title Search for the property involved was just received that afternoon. The ownership of Circle Drive was in question; the title search revealed that the area in question is owned by the original developer, Kebland Corp. Attorney Rappleyea noted as it is not owned by the Town of Greenville, it is strictly a neighbor issue, and that unless and if someone can bring it up to proper specifications, and dedicate it to the town, it is not our responsibility.

Councilman Rauf noted that Clerk-Collector Park would be leaving us in the new year and that he would like to thank her and hoped the Board would offer thanks as well, for her efforts as Clerk. The Councilmen all said thank you. This writer rejected the gracious act of kind acknowledgements as insincere, considering not one felt the need to appreciate my work, support my nomination at caucus, or speak out against what was done, in order to support my reelection. Supervisor Macko noted that he did indeed cast his vote for me, for which this writer thanked him for his public acknowledgement.

At 7:48 pm, this meeting was opened for public comments or questions:

Planning Board Chairman Donald Teator inquired as to what kind of public input is expected at the upcoming public hearing, and urged the Board to widely publicize it. Supervisor Macko stated he would make sure it is discussed ~ and put on the website, signboard, and perhaps the Library board.

Local business owner Donald Irving addressed the Board about previously alluded to problems with his business/property, The Westerner, relating to the cleaning of sidewalks. Discussion followed regarding the 4 foot sidewalks, plantings on site, and the proximity to the state highway. All agreed to work together to resolve any concerns as they arose.

Greenville Rescue Squad (GRS) member Fran Sickles inquired if the Board had received the proposed, five year contract for services, and asked if they would be able to render a decision by January or February. Supervisor Macko stated he was blown away with the first year's increase, and that we would definitely take a look at it but may need to have a few meetings with the GRS.

Mr. Rauf moved to enter executive session at 757 pm, seconded by Mr. Bear, to discuss the medical, financial, credit or employment history of a particular person/corp, or matters leading to said dismissal, removal, promotion, appointment, employment, discipline, demotion, or suspension. Greene County Legislator Greg Davis participated in this executive session.

Carried 5 ayes

Mr. Bear moved to return to regular session at 8:34 pm, seconded by Mr. Bensen. Carried 5 ayes

No motions were made in executive session.

Clerk-Collector Park clarified a prior motion made to hold a swearing in for newly elected officials, if it was to include all elected and appointed officials, or just the newly elected official. Supervisor Macko stated it was for everybody.

An audit of the monthly bills occurred;

This writer questioned if the mass-gathering law, peddler's and solicitor's law, or other would be required. An email was sent to the Board and Attorney on November 30th, without response. Discussion followed; it was determined that this would be handled by Zoning Enforcement Officer Mark Overbaugh, and the mass-gathering and peddler's laws were not indicated.

A special meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Greenville was held for the purpose of

conducting a public hearing regarding the proposed local law #1 of 2021: LOCAL LAW PURSUANT TO CANNABIS LAW SECTION 131 OPTING OUT OF LICENSING AND ESTABLISHING RETAIL CANNABIS DISPENSARIES AND ON-SITE CANNABIS CONSUMPTION ESTABLISHMENTS WITHIN THE TOWN OF GREENVILLE, subject to Permissive Referendum, on Thursday, December 30, 2021, at 6:30 pm at Pioneer Hall. The audio teleconference format was in use as well for those who wished to observe in that way. Appropriate notice of this hearing was published in the official newspaper, the Catskill Daily Mail, on 12/24/2021. Full audio file and unedited text transcription of tonight's meeting are available upon request.

Those present on-site: Supervisor Macko, Councilmen Bear, Rauf and Richards, Code Enforcement Officer Mark Overbaugh, Planning Board Chair Don Teator, as well as five guests.

Those present via teleconference: Attorney Tal Rappleyea and resident Ms. Anita Zibura. Absent: Councilman Bensen.

Supervisor Macko opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance Mr. Bear moved to open this hearing at 6:30 pm, seconded by Mr. Rauf. Carried 4 ayes

Supervisor Macko explained that the purpose of this hearing was to decide if Greenville wanted to be a part of cannabis dispensing and consumption in the town. If we decide not to act, the state assumes we've said yes, and we can't then get out of it. If we opt-out, we can always opt back in. But if we do nothing, and opt-in at this time, we are not able to later back out of this decision.

Supervisor Macko asked for any public comments or questions at 6:32 pm; Ms. Anita Zibura clarified if we opted out, can we opt in at a later time. Mr. Macko confirmed that, and noted we would have to amend our zoning law as well. Also, that it is not just related to dispensation, where to sell but if we will allow pubs/lounges/social use. His concern is that smoking marijuana in the parks, skateboard parks, etc. will become a problem. Code Enforcement Officer Mark Overbaugh noted we already had a law on the books banning any smoking on all town owned properties. Ms. Zibura wondered if this would impact Senator Hinchey's proposed legislation related to industrialized hemp; Attorney Rappleyea noted they were completely separate issues. Legislator Davis added that all states with legalized marijuana have seen increased deaths due to impaired drivers. Supervisor Macko stated that several residents have called him and urged him to not give up on the potential revenue. Councilman Rauf noted that the distribution of revenue is very cruel to towns; if a successful business sold \$1,000,000 of product, which would bring \$30,000 of tax revenue to the town. Stated his opinion was that we should opt out tonight and give the local residents a chance to referendum the issue, if that is their choice. "Truly it's the only way we as a Board should work to night. Legislator Davis stated as a resident, he was against the lounges and heavily questioned if the money made as a dispensary would be worth it to the town. Ms. Christine Mickelsen thinks it a good idea to opt out now, but asks the public be provided with information and education about this issue. Councilman Richards also feels we should opt out now, and allow a referendum to allow the town to speak, "not just the five people litting here". Councilman Bear reported feeling very concerned, and would also opt out.

All persons desiring to be heard, having been heard, Mr. Bear moved to close the public hearing at 6:45 pm, seconded by Mr. Rauf. Carried 4 ayes

Mr. Rauf moved have the Town of Greenville opt out of both local cannabis retail dispensaries and onsite consumption sites, seconded by Mr. Bear; resolution attached. Roll call requested:

RE: General Retainer

Dear Supervisor Macko:

Please accept this letter as my retainer to represent the Town of Greenville as Attorney for the Town on all general matters for the calendar year 2022. This retainer is intended to cover and include attendance at regular Town Board meetings, and agenda workshop and special meetings and other Board meetings on an "as needed" basis, review of minor contracts, minor tax certiorari as needed (such need to be determined by the Town Assessor upon approval by the Town Board), minor local law drafting and review, minor real property conveyances, and general consultations and advice at a monthly fee of \$1,200.00 (\$14,400 annually), for which a standard voucher shall be submitted. This retainer is for both my availability on a 24-hour/day, 7-days/week basis and the above work. However, this retainer is not a "non-refundable retainer" and to the extent that the Town deems that I have not earned the retainer in any month it may request, I shall reimburse such amount deemed unearned. I am and shall be treated as an "independent contractor" and shall pay my own withholdings and taxes. Additionally, as such I am not eligible for nor seek health or retirement benefits.

However, the above monthly general retainer amount is not intended to include litigation, major contracts and projects and major real property transactions or planning/zoning applications for which an escrow account is established by the applicant. In the event any situation arises wherein the work is deemed to not be included under the general retainer, any work/time performed on such matters will be charged at \$125.00 per hour. No matter shall be billed as an hourly item outside the retainer without prior approval by the Town Board. Such items shall also be billed on a monthly basis, with a standard voucher and itemization of the work performed.

This Letter of Engagement is furnished to you in accordance with Part 1215 of the Joint Rules of the Appellate Division. It is hereby acknowledged that we have reviewed the enclosed Statement of Client's Rights and the Statement of Client's Responsibilities and that you have no questions or concerns therewith.

Dear Mr. Templeton:

Thank you for your September 27, 2021 request for speed limit reductions on Irving and Turon Roads in the Town of Greenville.

Currently, Irving Road between Route 32 and CR 37 is posted with a 40 MPH speed limit, established by this office in 1988. In response to your recent request, we conducted a review of the speed limit on this section of Irving Road and determined that 40 MPH is appropriate for the existing conditions.

We also reviewed the requested section of Turon Road between-CR-26-and-Irving Road. Based on our review and our experience with similar highways; we have determined we have determined a 40 MPH speed limit is warranted on this road. We have written a Notice of Order for this highway, which is currently being filed with the Secretary of State. Upon receipt of the Order, you may arrange to have the appropriate speed limit signs installed in accordance with the 2009 MUTCD and NYS Supplement.

January 2022 Annual Report from Town Historian

To Supervisor Macko, Town Board members Bear, Bensen, Richards, Rauf:

2021 proved to be another interesting and challenging year for your Town Historian. The effects of Covid once again altered some of the more visible signs of my duties as Town Historian but, again, as in 2020, this led to adaptation and opportunity.

With an uncertain start of the year, GLHG meetings April-July were canceled. Instead, newsletters took a cue from last year. Articles from the community added a new depth to the newsletter, and I could draw attention to archives that might normally be overlooked. Then, in August, meetings at the Library were allowed and the GLHG met through October.

The success of the alternative newsletter has prompted newsletters into the winter months. In addition to the 215 online members, another fifteen receive the mail version. And I am pleased to see that Jackie and Paul included the newsletter into Town Board monthly agendas and minutes.

Articles written by community members included:

- an interview with Rich McAneny
- several vignettes of Greenville life penned by Flip Flach (Country Doings, Transportation in Greenville, Greenville Pond)
- a continuing series of Greenville life according to Greenville Local newspaper as summarized by Audrey Matott: this time, the 1980s, which comprised a program while I was absent; in addition, Audrey wrote about the razing of the Vanderbilt Theater, Greenville Illuminated, or early electricity in Greenville; and Greenville's Trees
- a two part account from Ken Mabey of his growing up days in Freehold
- Garth Bryant's tale of a historical marker to move, and Lake history
- reprint of the local area 1949 telephone directory
- celebration of Baumann Brookside's centennial
- more of the Turner table

Newsletter articles/programs I crafted included: Dumpville (when Greenville almost became the county landfill); output from a Freehold souvenir store; groups of sisters, this time the Stevenses; removal of the Presbyterian Church bell; Community Partners; It's a Small World: how Hilde Werner was found from a postcard stamp; and a slide show of my Top 40 Wow photos from past calendars.

And a few stray notes included historic registers that include houses in Greenville; barbers; and what to do with contradictory accounts of the same event.

The Greenville Local History Group calendar remains one of my significant projects, as it has for thirty years. During this time, 27 calendars have been produced. The earlier calendars tended to show reproduced older photos, juxtaposed with insets of the current spot. The later calendars have incorporated recent trends to reflect the local history that is Greenville today. Almost 400 photos

have graced the calendar pages over three decades. Together, the photos reveal a broad overview of Greenville's history while at the same time exemplifying the trends with the details. When I first became Historian, I made one of my early goals to obtain copies of these images and then share them with the community. I have done so, and at nearly no taxpayer expense.

For the record, the calendars date: 1991-2005, 2009-2010, 2012, 2014 to present. The 2022 calendar shows another dozen slices of life of the Greenville area, with a mix of young, middle, and older eras. The usual 50-75 hours of preparation is needed for the 12-14 mini-research projects, including the caption writing and the proofing. A beginning of the 2023 calendar has started.

Another project, the maintenance of a 10,000 photo collection, is a priority. During the year, I added a few hundred photos of recent scenes and a several dozen scans of old photos.

One of my sizeable undertakings this past winter was to resurrect my website and with it three pages of local history material: one for the 300 newsletters I have produced since 1989; the second page showing about 100 boarding houses and resorts in the area; and the third page detailing the material and articles in the files and archives kept in the records room. Dozens of hours finally produced a serviceable asset for the community.

I am alerting you that this website is a personal website, built and maintained at my own expense. It would be advisable to consider where the website material is best stored. I believe this is a community resources that should be stored on town resources. For now, the expense is totally mine, with web creation of my own doing, as has been the case for almost 20 years.

One outing a month ago was to assist community member Ed Volmar in his Potter Hollow Schoolhouse mission. We interviewed several graduates of that school, with assistance of staff and students of GCS.

I believe my background as Historian has been occasionally drawn upon to add fuller context to agenda topics of the Greenville Planning Board of which I am a member.

Audrey Matott continues to moderate the Facebook page: The Greenville Local History Group. Audrey posts often, usually with scans of Greenville Local articles, and I occasionally post a photo with some history. At last check, this Facebook page has over 1000 members, a wonderful opportunity to share Greenville local history. A job well done is extended to Audrey.

Various other projects and duties cover the spectrum of a Historian's duties. In 2021, they included:

- attending to Town Board requests
- responding to about 10 letters
- answering about thirty phone calls
- replying to over seventy emails asking for genealogical and local history information
- cross-referencing articles of local historical importance

In closing, I feel 2021 was a productive local history year in Greenville, made possible with the help of many people: my wife Debra, the Greenville Local History Group, the Town Board, and the hundreds of individuals who, through action and encouragement, have proven that Greenville respects its local history. As of April 2022, marking a third of a century, I will have had the pleasure and joy of serving and collaborating with the other local history minded community members.
