Supervisors Report

Bill paying/audit of bills

SPECIAL MEETING BUDGET WORKSHOP #2 October 17th, 2022 5:00pm

A special meeting was held by the Town Board of the Town of Greenville on October 17th, 2022 at 5:00pm at Pioneer to conduct the second budget workshop for the 2023 budget cycle. Supervisor Macko opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance at 5:01pm.

All members of the Board were present. Highway Superintendent Mike Dudley, Planning Board Chair/Historian Don Teator were present, as well as, Maintenance Supervisor Tim Fitzgerald.

This workshop was advertised in the Town's official newspaper, The Catskill Daily Mail, on September 24th, 2022.

Supervisor Macko reported that he had sat with Sole Assessor Gordon Bennett to gather updates on the Town's taxable value for this meeting. The Town has had a three million dollar increase in taxable value. Supervisor Macko also reported that he updated the revenues and reiterated that a 6% raise has been added to all positions.

The tentative 2023 budget was gone through line by line. The following points of discussion were had:

Postage – A separate line was added to the budget for all postage needs (1670.4). Each department that does mailings contributed to this line from their contractual lines. The total added to this line for the 2023 tentative budget is \$3600.

IT – A separate line was added to the budget for all IT needs (1680.4). This will be used instead of the Buildings line that has been done in the past. The total added to this line for the 2023 tentative budget is \$6000, as suggested by Edmunds Govtech.

Highway – The garage line was raised because there was a significant deficit this year. (2022 Final Adopted Budget: \$16,000, 2023 Tentative Budget; \$25,500). No further comments were made regarding this.

Veterans Services – At the first budget hearing a raise for this line had been discussed, 2022 Final Adopted Budget: \$2,000, 2023 Tentative Budget: \$2,120. After some discussion it was decided to keep this line at \$2,000 for 2023.

Parks – Parks equipment contractual line has increased after much discussion at the first budget workshop. The budget officer stentative 2023 line was for \$11,500. The preliminary budget for 2023 will have \$21,500 in the park's contractual line.

State Retirement and Worker's Comp – The Town paid portion for state retirement has gone down by ~\$10,000 and worker's comp is calling for a 5% predicted increase. If worker's comp is paid by a certain date there is a 3% discount applied which would reduce this increase.

Sewer - Supervisor Macko still has not heard from Myer's regarding 2023 rate increases.

SPECIAL MEETING BUDGET WORKSHOP #2 October 17th, 2022 5:00pm

Greenville Fire – These numbers will be solidified after the Fire District holds their Public Hearing on October 18th, 2022.

Lighting Districts – There was lengthy discussion about the increases added to the lighting districts at the first budget hearing. Ultimately, the Board decided to keep the amounts they opted for at the last hearing and will discuss upgrades to the light posts in the regular scheduled Town Board meeting.

Rescue Squad – Negotiations are still underway between the Town and Greenville Rescue Squad Inc, therefore the final numbers for the 2023 budget are not ready at this time.

Supervisor Macko called on the hearing for any further questions/comments/concerns three times before adjourning this meeting at 6:15pm.

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PUBLIC HEARING RE: FREEHOLD FIRE CONTRACT October 17th, 2022 6:30pm

A public hearing was held by the Town Board of the Town of Greenville on October 17th, 2022 at 6:30 pm at Pioneer Hall regarding the renewal of the Freehold Fire District Contract.

All members of the Board were present. Highway Superintendent Mike Dudley, Planning Board Chair/Historian Don Teator, Maintenance Supervisor Tim Fitzgerald were present, as well as, 9 other guests.

This Public Hearing was advertised in the Town's official newspaper, The Catskill Daily Mail, on October 1st, 2022.

At 6:30pm on October 17th, 2022 Councilman Bear motioned, seconded by Councilman Bensen to open the Public Hearing for public remark on the signing the proposed five year contract with the Freehold Fire Department. Carried 5 ayes

Supervisor Macko informed the hearing that typically the contract with Freehold Fire District is for four years, this year they proposed a five-year contract to help them allocate funding for the necessary upgrades to their airpack systems.

Supervisor Macko read aloud the proposed contract. The following points of discussion were had:

Airpacks – The NFPA requires 13 of the airpacks be replaced to keep Freehold Fire Dept in compliance. The cost for these upgrades is approximately \$200,000.00. The Fire Dept plans to stagger their purchasing of the airpacks to help prevent them all expiring at the same time again.

Grants – A \$75,000.00 grant is being awarded to Freehold Fire District from Senator Hinchey's office. Freehold Fire is still looking at all grants possible to help alleviate costs to the necessary upgrades for their Scott Airpacks.

Pumper Truck – A Fire Department in Long Island has donated a pumper truck to the Freehold Fire District. This truck normally would have cost them around \$80,000.00.

Greene County Paramedic Fly Car. The Freehold Fire Dept is doing renovations to the fire house to prepare for hosting the County Fly Car.

Supervisor Macko called upon the hearing three times for any further questions/comments/concerns. Supervisor Macko then expressed thanks on behalf of the Board for the Fire Department's service and dedication to keeping the Town safe.

Councilman Bensen motioned, seconded by Councilman Bear to adopt the five-year contract with Freehold Fire District as proposed.

Carried 5 ayes

At 6:35pm Councilman Bensen motioned, seconded by Councilman Bear to close the Public Hearing.

SPECIAL/EMERGENCY MEETING RE: SCHEDULING PUBLIC HEARING October 26th, 2022 4:30pm

An emergency meeting was called to order by Supervisor Macko on October 26th, 2022 at 4:30pm at Pioneer Hall. This meeting was posted to the Town Website Calendar and Signboard outside of Pioneer Hall. Supervisor Macko started this meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance at 4:31pm.

Four Board members were present, Councilman Richards was absent. Attorney Tal Rappleyea was present via teleconference.

Supervisor Macko explained that the purpose this meeting was to schedule and appropriately give notice/advertise that a Public Hearing will be held to discuss the Town's contract renewal with Greenville Rescue Squad Inc.

The contract would cover from 2023-2027 and would require renegotiations for years 2-5 of the contract contingent upon the Town putting up a new building for Rescue to use. This would save Greenville Rescue Squad Inc a lot of money on a yearly basis causing the taxes to the residents of the town to be lower.

Attorney Tal Rappleyea recommended to the Board to add a stipulation to the contract before adopting it requiring Greenville Rescue Squad Inc to show the Town their financial reports yearly.

Councilman Bensen motioned, seconded by Councilman Bear to schedule a Public Hearing on November 9, 2022 at 6:45 pm to adopt the new contract with the Town of Greenville and Greenville Rescue Squad Inc. Carried 4 ayes

There being no further business this meeting was adjourned at 4:40pm.

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PUBLIC HEARING RE: 2023 BUDGET ADOPTION November 9th, 2022 7:00pm

A public hearing was held by the Town Board of the Town of Greenville on November 9th, 2022 at 7:00pm at Pioneer Hall regarding the adoption of the 2023 Preliminary Budget.

Four members of the Board were present, Councilman Richards was absent. Fran Sickles, Ted Nugent and Cliff Powell Sr. were present to represent Greenville Rescue Squad Inc. Water Superintendent Leroy Bear, Deputy Water Superintendent Renee Hamilton, CEO Mark Overbaugh, and Highway Superintendent Mike Dudley were present, as well as, 3 other guests.

This Public Hearing was advertised in the Town's official newspaper, The Catskill Daily Mail, on October 28th, 2022.

Councilman Bear motioned, seconded by Councilman Bensen to open the Public Hearing to adopt the 2023 preliminary budget at 7:00pm. Carried 4 ayes

Supervisor Macko read aloud the attached Budget Summary and reiterated the Town's goal is to attract and retain employees, hence the 6% raise on all positions—stating that while this does not put us ahead of the inflation rate it does help.

Questions/Comments/Concerns from the public:

Lighting Districts: A concerned resident asked the Board if they had contact Central Hudson for a cost analysis on the lighting districts to potentially convert the existing lights to be more efficient. Supervisor Macko replied that the Board has discussed this and will be looking into it:

Supervisor Macko called upon the hearing three times for any questions/comments/concerns.

With no further remarks from the public Councilman Bensen motioned, seconded by Councilman Bear to close the Public Hearing. Carried 4 ayes

Councilman Bensen motioned, seconded by Councilman Von Atzingen to adopt the 2023 Budget as presented. Carried 4 ayes

Councilman Bensen motioned, seconded by Councilman Von Atzingen to appoint Renee Hamilton as Water Superintendent and Zach McGrath as Deputy Water Superintendent effective January 1st, 2023. This motion also supports Renee training Zach 2 days per week starting November 1st, 2022.

Carried 4 ayes

Supervisor Macko informed the Board that the heating fuel rates have increased to over \$6/gallon. He is asking the Board to consider converting the boilers at Pioneer Hall and the Boy Scout building to operate off of propane. This discussion will be tabled until the November 21st Town Board meeting when quotes for conversion installation and fuel rates can be gathered.

CEO Mark Overbaugh informed the Board that he would like to volunteer to be a member of the building committee for the Greenville Rescue Squad Inc. contract.

PUBLIC HEARING RE: 2023 BUDGET ADOPTION November 9th, 2022 7:00pm

Councilman Bensen motioned, seconded by Councilman Von Atzingen to approve the Building & Grounds Department to move forward with replacing the tires on the Dodge pickup at Lou's for up to \$820.

At 7:22pm Councilman Bensen motioned, seconded by Councilman Von Atzingen to go into executive session to discuss information relating to current/future investigation or prosecution of a criminal offense. Carried 4 ayes

At 7:42pm Councilman Bensen motioned, seconded by Councilman Von Atzingen to return to regular session.

There being no further business this meeting was adjourned at 7:43pm.

A public hearing was held by the Town Board of the Town of Greenville on November 9th, 2022 at 6:45pm at Pioneer Hall regarding the contract renewal of Greenville Rescue Squad Inc.

Four members of the Board were present, Councilman Richards was absent. Fran Sickles, Ted Nugent and Cliff Powell Sr. were present to represent Greenville Rescue Squad Inc. Water Superintendent Leroy Bear, Deputy Water Superintendent Renee Hamilton, CEO Mark Overbaugh, and Highway Superintendent Mike Dudley were present, as well as, 3 other guests.

This Public Hearing was advertised in the Town's official newspaper. The Catskill Daily Mail, on October 29th, 2022.

Supervisor Macko opened the Public Hearing to approve the contract with the Town and Greenville Rescue Squad Inc with the Pledge of Allegiance at 6:45pm.

Supervisor Macko gave a brief overview of the proposed contract emphasizing that staffing issues and inflation have been affecting all businesses. The contract is for five years and including County EMS would be a 35.08123% increase. The contract states that the Town will put up a building for Greenville Rescue Squad Inc. to utilize—location to be determined. Doing this would save Greenville Rescue Squad Inc. a significant amount of money every year in utilities, mortgage, etc. After the new quarters are built the contract will be renegotiated to reflect these changes and new rates. Supervisor Macko also mentioned that there is a taskforce at the County that has been working on creating a county-wide ambulance service. The new building would be able to accommodate these potential changes as well.

Questions/Comments/Concerns From the public:

What is the price tag on the new building? Supervisor Macko responded that there was not a price tag yet as they have not reached out for quotes yet. There was discussion regarding the increase in interest rates and how this would inevitably affect the bottom line.

What is the timeframe on the new building? Supervisor Macko responded that there isn't a definite timeframe yet as no design has been drawn up yet and the property that the building will be put on has not been designated yet.

Supervisor Macko called upon the hearing three times for any questions/comments/concerns.

With no further remarks from the public Councilman Bear thanked Greenville Rescue Squad Inc. for sitting and coming up with a new agreement, reiterating that their services are very important to the community. Ted Nugent responded thanking the Board for continuing Greenville Rescue Squad Inc.'s 50 years of service stating they are excited to continue providing service to the community.

There being no further remarks from the public Councilman Bear motioned, seconded by Councilman Bensen to close the Public Hearing. Carried 4 ayes

PUBLIC HEARING RE: RESCUE SQUAD CONTRACT November 9th, 2022 6:45pm

Councilman Bensen motioned, seconded by Councilman Von Atzingen to accept the proposed five year contract with the Town of Greenville and Greenville Rescue Squad Inc.



Each year the Greene County Legislature reviews the maximum income limits for the "Aged Senior Citizen's Tax Exemption" (RPTL §467) as well as the "Persons with Disabilities and Limited Income Tax Exemptions" (RPTL §459-c) for county tax purposes. These exemptions use the property owner(s) gross annual income from all sources to determine eligibility.

This year, the NYS legislature addressed that they had not raised the maximum income limits from \$29,000 pursuant to Real Property Tax Law §467 & §459-c since 2009. Senate Bill S3085-A and Assembly Bill A3596-A were signed into law on August 8, 2022, allowing by local option, to increase the maximum income limit up to \$50,000.

Greene County has not raised the income limits from the previous maximum of \$29,000 since 2019 for use on the 2020 Assessment Roll.

After careful analysis, I recommended that for the 2023 Assessment Roll that the County increase the maximum income limit for a 50% exemption to \$34,000.00 with full sliding scales for both exemptions as shown in the following table.

The Greene County Legislature will be holding public hearings in December and are preparing to adopt the above limits on December 21, 2022.





Both Kathie and Bill gave acceptance speeches. In the longer speech, Bill recounted a personal family history and then the beginnings and evolution of the Greenville Pharmacy. By account's end, Bill thanked the community for honoring them. It was a heartwarming tale, to be sure. For those of you not

here, you should be proud of this recognition effort. In a reciprocal act, GLHG honors those who give much, and they, in turn, honor us.

Although we honor some community members posthumously in some years, it feels so much better to recognize our neighbors while living.

Although no one calendar captures the essence of Greenville—a quixotic quest I yearn to complete some year—I annually hope that the calendar not only brings attention to more parts of Greenville area history but also reinforces the local history values we want to share with the community.

And, I think the 2023 calendar has risen to the occasion.

- Town Supervisor Paul Macko's accomplishments as the second longest serving Supervisor since 1900
- consecutive pages of the same property one as resort, one as spiritual center
- the initial effort of Arts Around Greenville
- a never-before-done three page recognition of Troop 42 Boy Scouts and a listing of all Eagle Scout projects (a special thank you to Colin and Nancy Tumey for their help)
- noting the forty years of Hudson River Valley Art Workshops at the Greenville Arms
- the continuation of renovation/restoration/ replacement of houses/properties in the town
- a celebration of 30 years of the Greenville Town Park
- a delivery of three truckloads of Arctic Cat snowmobiles in Freehold

Also:

- the cover showing the Prevost House as sketched by Claribel Gardiner
- our recognition of Bill and Kathie Quackenbush

I like to have one-third prepared by New Year's Day and the next third by March. It is the last third that I dawdle over but it allows time for last minute good ideas.

So, I am looking at my notes from this previous year, promising to look for a great photo that we have overlooked for thirty years (I found one already!) and thinking about the blank spots the calendar has not given attention to.

Thus, if you can think of a community topic, recent or middle age or old, contact me either with a specific photo or with a general idea for me to contemplate. It is your assistance that helps me create a calendar each year.

The lead-up slide show, this year, had the theme of renovations.

The last dozen calendars have featured a structure whose improvement makes that area a more appealing area. They include:

- the June Clark house, two houses above the post office (done before our regular recognition, 1993)
- the Cubillo house (next to Chatterbox, across from church, 2005)
- the Martinez structure (today Cutting Corner, formerly Janet Lacy, on Freehold's four corners, 2010)

It is not a Town of Greenville property (please do not call Paul Macko or other town board members.) And now this Association Board is exerting extra effort on upkeep.

It will take hours of work, volunteer efforts, and money to make this happen. Jack came to announce the new efforts, voice a plea for help, and coordinate a new effort to preserve one of Greenville's gems.

The history that the cemetery represents is vast enough, important enough that GLHG, and other organizations, should consider how to help.

"Duffy" - Greenville's Forgotten Hero by Garth Bryant

When I was a boy, I knew a man named "Duffy". I knew him through my friendship with the McNaughtons who owned the resort and bar next door. Duffy was a friend of their family.

John and Don McNaughton were around the same age as my sister Beth and I, and we all became very close friends. We

spent countless hours together at their resort doing all the things kids do. One thing we would do was search the roadside ditches for beer and soda bottles. There was a two-cent deposit on them and a small bottle of Coke at McNaughton's Bar cost, I think, 14 cents. If you could find seven bottles you could get an ice-cold Coke on a hot summer day.

When we brought our bottles in, sometimes Duffy would be tending bar. Sometimes he was on the other side of the bar drinking. He was a small man with an Irish accent. I assumed he was an Irish immigrant. He was almost always impeccably dressed. He would usually be wearing dress pants and a dress shirt. Much of the time he wore a tie.

During colder weather he often wore a stylish leather coat. His wavy dark hair was always neatly combed back and held firmly in place by some thick hair product. To everyone who greeted him, he was simply "Duffy."

I didn't even know if it was his first or last name for quite a while. But his full name was William M. Duffy and he was born in New York City October 18, 1931, not in Ireland.



When I grew up and started to go to the bars myself, Duffy was still there. He worked in all the North Road bars as a bartender and in some as a cook. When he wasn't working, he could often times be found on the customers' side of the bar. Most people seemed to genuinely like him. I know I did. He had a soft spot for all the children. For many years he organized a Christmas party for local kids at either the American Legion or the Brass Rail.

Sometimes Duffy drank too much. Some people didn't approve of this. I never really gave it any thought. I never wondered why he drank. He was always really nice to me and I was respectful to him. That was good enough. It was an era when a lot of local men drank in the bars on an almost daily basis. Many of these men had good reason to drink, I just didn't know it at the time.

For a while he drove around in a big light blue convertible. That car ended up in the small stream just north of the Brass Rail one night. I can still remember stopping on the bridge and he was still sitting in the front seat. As was the custom in those days, a bunch of locals helped him pull it out without any reporting necessary.

Duffy died without fanfare Dec. 1, 2009

at Stratton VA hospital in Albany and was buried in Saratoga National Cemetery.

In talking to Phil Wendell about him, Phil mentioned that Duffy was one of Greenville's most highly decorated veterans. It was surprising to me that in spite of having known this man for more than forty years I didn't know this. I decided to look into his story a little deeper.

William Duffy served in the US Army, Company F, 17th Infantry, 7th US Infantry Division during the Korean War. He was awarded the following badges and medals - Korean Service Medal, United Nations Service Medal, Combat Medical Badge, Parachutist Badge, Good Conduct Medal, Expert Qualification Badge with Rifle BAR.

He was awarded four separate Bronze Stars for Heroism in Ground Combat. One of these actions resulted in him being wounded in action and for this he earned a Purple Heart. Only 30,359 Bronze Stars were issued during the Korean War. Of those perhaps half were issued for valor. The rest were issued for non-combat activities. Duffy earned all four of his, the hard way, for valor in combat. He was also awarded America's third highest medal, the Silver Star, for Gallantry in Action. This is an extraordinary number of medals. The number of service men decorated for five separate acts of bravery is exceedingly small. This is the official report of his Silver Star commendation:

"Award of the Silver Star – By direction of the President, the Silver Star for gallantry in action is awarded to the following enlisted

Sergeant William Duffy RA12361188, Infantry, United States Army, a member of Company F, 17th Infantry, distinguished himself by gallantry in action near Sokkogae, Korea. On 8 & 9 July 1953 when Pork Chop Hill was being counterattacked by Fox Company, 17th Infantry, Sergeant Duffy displayed great courage and espirit de corps. Early in the morning of 8 July, 1953, while directing fire from Hill 347 to Brinson's Finger, Sergeant Duffy noticed wounded and dying men in the valley separating those ridges. Acting quickly, he obtained an aid bag and while under constant mortar and sniper fire, went to the aid of these men. He administered first aid and did not leave the area until the last wounded man was evacuated. Unknown to Sergeant Duffy his unit had been ordered off Hill 347 to counterattack Pork Chop Hill. Although he hadn't eaten in 24 hours, Sergeant Duffy moved to rejoin his platoon. While in charge of the left flank of an assault platoon on Pork Chop Hill, armed only with grenades and a carbine, he crawled forward and destroyed an automatic weapons position to enable the platoon to advance. He then aided two more wounded comrades by moving them to a more sheltered area. When Sergeant Duffy learned that medical supplies were low, he mounted a personnel carrier and manned the 50 Caliber machine gun, while constantly exposing himself to mortar and small arms fire, so he could deliver the much needed medical supplies. After arriving at the checkpoint for the second time, Sergeant Duffy was so weak from hunger and fatigue that he had to be removed from the personnel carrier. The gallantry displayed by Sergeant Duffy reflects great credit on himself and is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service."

As impressive as this written record is, I am sure it doesn't come close to his real lived experience. The Battle of Pork Chop Hill is one of the best known and most ferocious of the Korean War. The horrors he witnessed and the terrors he must have experienced in this and all the other battles he fought in are beyond imagining. Through it all Sergeant Duffy heroically fought on, serving more than two years in combat in Korea.

When Duffy came home, he lived a very simple life. Maybe he had trouble shaking the memories of what he had been through. Maybe those times when he drank, he could forget those memories, for at least a little while. Who knows, and who are we to judge? Perhaps if more of us had known and acknowledged his heroism we could have made it a little easier for him, perhaps not.

Never once in all the years I knew him did I hear a single person say, "that man over there is an American Hero". It's hard to understand how this oversight occurred.

Regardless, I would at this time like to offer a much belated but heartfelt THANK YOU FOR YOUR SERVICE, Sergeant William Duffy, and THANK YOU FOR YOUR HEROISM. You were one of the bravest men to ever live in our Town. I wish I had known earlier.

The service of all our veterans is too quickly forgotten. These men and women deserve our support. Locally one of the best ways of doing this is to support the various activities of Greenville American Legion Post 291.
